## Supporting Statement for the Recordkeeping and Disclosure Requirements Associated with Regulation Y for Minimum Requirements for Appraisal Management Companies (FR HY-5; OMB No. 7100-0370)

#### Summary

The Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System (Board), under authority delegated by the Office of Management and Budget (OMB), proposes to extend for three years, without revision, the Recordkeeping and Disclosure Requirements Associated with Regulation Y for Minimum Requirements for Appraisal Management Companies (FR HY-5; OMB No. 7100-0370)<sup>1</sup>. In 2015, the Board and certain other agencies published a final rule<sup>2</sup> implementing part of section 1473 of the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act (Dodd-Frank Act),<sup>3</sup> which relates to the supervision and regulation of appraisal management companies (AMCs). An AMC is an entity that serves as an intermediary for, and provides certain appraisal-related services to, creditors.<sup>4</sup> The Board's final rule instituted certain recordkeeping and disclosure requirements for AMCs and U.S. states, which are located in the Board's Regulation Y - Bank Holding Companies and Change in Bank Control (12 CFR Part 225)<sup>5</sup>.

The current estimated total annual burden for the FR HY-5 is 2,457 hours.

#### **Background and Justification**

Section 1473 of the Dodd-Frank Act added section 1124 to Title XI of the Financial Institutions Reform, Recovery, and Enforcement Act of 1989 (FIRREA). The new section required the agencies to establish, by rule, minimum requirements to be applied by states in the registration and supervision of AMCs.<sup>6</sup> These minimum requirements apply to states that have elected to establish an appraiser certifying and licensing agency with authority to register and supervise AMCs (participating states). Participating states must require AMCs to register with

and be subject to supervision by the state's appraiser certifying and licensing agency. Such requirements must apply to all AMCs, except that AMCs that are a subsidiary of an insured depository institution (a federally regulated AMC) are not required to register with a state. States are not required to establish an appraiser certifying and licensing agency with authority to register and supervise AMCs; however, a non-federally regulated AMC may not provide services for a federally related transaction in a state that does not establish such a program.<sup>7</sup>

Section 1473 of the Dodd-Frank Act also amended Title XI to require the Appraisal Subcommittee (ASC) of the Federal Financial Institutions Examination Council to maintain an AMC National Registry, which includes AMCs that are either registered with and subject to supervision by a state appraiser certifying and licensing agency or are federally regulated AMCs. It also added a requirement that participating states collect annual registry fees from AMCs. Further, section 1473 of the Dodd-Frank Act requires the agencies to promulgate regulations for the reporting of the activities of AMCs to the ASC relating to the determination of the AMCs' annual registry fee.

The requirements associated with section 1124 of Title XI were implemented by the Board, as part of a joint rulemaking with the agencies, in 2015. This information enables effective supervisory oversight of AMCs and the broader appraisal process. This information is not available from other sources.

## **Description of Information Collection**

The Board's recordkeeping and disclosure requirements associated with the minimum requirements for AMCs are found in sections 225.192, 225.193, and 225.195 of the Board's Regulation Y, Subpart M. Compliance with the information collections is mandatory for AMCs and required to obtain a benefit for states.

## Recordkeeping Requirements

**Registration and Supervision Program.** Participating states must have an AMC registration and supervision program. Pursuant to section 225.193(a), each participating state must establish and maintain within its appraiser certifying and licensing agency a registration and supervision program with the legal authority and mechanisms to, among other things, review and approve or deny an AMC's application for initial registration; require AMCs to submit reports, information, and documents; and report violations of appraisal-related laws, regulations, or orders, and disciplinary and enforcement actions to the ASC.

## Disclosure Requirements

Written Notice of Appraiser Removal from Network or Panel. Section 225.192(b) provides that an appraiser in an AMC's network or panel is deemed to remain a part of the AMC's appraiser panel until the AMC (1) sends a written notice to the appraiser removing the appraiser with an explanation or (2) receives a written notice from the appraiser asking to be removed or a notice of the death or incapacity of the appraiser.

**State Regulated AMC Reporting Requirements.** Section 225.193(b) requires each participating state to require AMCs that are not owned and controlled by an insured depository institution and not regulated by a Federal financial institutions regulatory agency to register with the state appraiser certifying and licensing agency.

**Federally Regulated AMC Reporting Requirements.** Section 225.195(c) requires a federally regulated AMC to report to the state or states in which it operates the information required to be submitted by the state pursuant to the ASC's policies regarding the determination of the AMC National Registry fee, including information relating to certain ownership limitations in the regulation.

The Board understands that respondents use information technology to comply with these provisions, including potential electronic submission of the application for initial registration, reports, information, and documents, as well as electronic reports of violations of appraisal-related laws, regulations, or orders, and disciplinary and enforcement actions to the ASC. AMCs and appraisers may also communicate electronically with one another regarding inclusion on an AMC's appraiser panel. Additionally, AMCs that are not owned and controlled by an insured depository institution and not regulated by a Federal financial institution's regulatory agency may electronically submit registration information to their state appraiser certifying and licensing agency. AMCs may also electronically send information required to be submitted by the state pursuant to the ASC's policies regarding the determination of the AMC National Registry fee. Finally, states may electronically submit to the ASC the information required to be submitted by the ASC regulations or guidance concerning AMCs that operate in the state.

## **Respondent Panel**

The FR HY-5 panel comprises federally regulated and state regulated AMCs and U.S. states, except that AMCs that oversee 15 or fewer appraisers in a state or less than 25 appraisers in two or more states are exempt from these recordkeeping and disclosure requirements.

## Frequency and Time Schedule

The FR HY-5 is retained/disclosed on an event-generated basis. The recordkeeping requirements for FR HY-5 are kept and updated on an ongoing basis.

## **Public Availability of Data**

The AMC National Registry is available to the public on the ASC website<sup>8</sup>. No information is collected by or made publicly available by the Board as part of this information collection.

#### Legal Status

FIRREA authorizes the FR HY-5. Agencies must "jointly, by rule, establish minimum requirements to be applied by a State in the registration of [AMCs]."<sup>9</sup> The Agencies further must "jointly promulgate regulations for the reporting of the activities of [AMCs] to the [ASC] in determining the payment of the annual registry.<sup>10</sup> Each participating state with an appraiser certifying and licensing agency must also transmit to the ASC "[1] a roster listing individuals who have received a State certification or license ... [2] reports on the issuance and renewal of licenses and certifications, sanctions, disciplinary actions, license and certification revocations, and license and certification revocations, and license and certifications initiated and disciplinary actions taken."<sup>11</sup> This collection is also authorized by section 1473 of the Dodd Frank Act.<sup>12</sup>

The FR HY-5 recordkeeping and disclosure requirements are mandatory for an AMC that is: (1) an appraisal management company that is a subsidiary owned and controlled by a financial institution and regulated by a federal financial institution regulatory agency, 13 or (2) is registered with a state that has a state appraiser certifying and licensing agency.

The Federal Reserve does not collect information subject to the HY-5 recordkeeping and disclosure requirements. If information subject to the HY-5 requirements is obtained as part of an examination or supervision of a financial institution, it may be considered confidential under exemption 8 of the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA).<sup>14</sup> Information subject to the HY-5 Requirements may also be kept confidential under FOIA exemption 4 if it is confidential commercial or financial information that is both customarily and actually treated as private.<sup>15</sup>

#### **Consultation Outside the Agency**

The Board, OCC, FDIC, and FHFA collaborated in reassessing and confirming their burden estimates and methodologies for this submission.

#### **Public Comments**

On December 23, 2024, the Board published an initial notice in the *Federal Register* (89 FR 104542) requesting public comment for 60 days on the extension, without revision, of the FR HY-5. The comment period for this notice expires on February 21, 2025.

#### **Estimate of Respondent Burden**

As shown in the table below, the estimated total annual burden for the FR HY-5 is 2,457 hours. The Board's estimated number of respondents and burden hours for sections 225.193(a),

225.192(b), 225.193(b), and 225.195(c) are based on a percentage of the total estimated number of respondents for the agencies, which all have identical requirements<sup>16</sup>. These recordkeeping and disclosure requirements represent less than 1 percent of the Board's total paperwork burden.

The estimated total annual cost to the public for these collections of information is \$139,071.<sup>18</sup>

#### **Sensitive Questions**

This collection of information contains no questions of a sensitive nature, as defined by OMB guidelines, although it is possible that a participating state could ask questions of a sensitive nature pursuant to its authority to require an application or report from an AMC, or that

a participating state may report sensitive information to the ASC pursuant to the requirement that the state report violations of appraisal-related laws, regulations, or orders, and disciplinary and enforcement actions.
